Esteemed Commissioners,

I fully support the statement in the Recreation Master Plan that a top priority should be the formation of a single entity like a recreation department or district as we move forward to coordinate and manage our facilities. My number one concern is putting any more money into fields and facilities with the state of the ones we have now in disrepair, especially the fair grounds and some of the parks.

I personally support a Recreation District to fund a pool, gyms, and climbing wall. The amount of money I would pay as a homeowner being taxed is approximately 1/2 of what I pay yearly to travel to the Jackson, Heise, and Green Canyon pools. Furthermore, as the Volleyball Club of the Tetons youth director, the difficulty we had in finding gym space this summer to serve our 80 girls was absurd. Again, though, before we fund anything I'd like to be confident in the board of directors and staff to assure the public these new facilities would be well taken care of.

I would like to see all of you encourage the School Board members to be well versed in this recreation plan before attempting to pass a bond for new schools and consider the needs assessment as outlined in this document. Furthermore, the fact that our school district has a one page document as a "strategic plan" compared to this document is a major concern and I believe pressure from you all to put more effort into their comprehensive strategic plan would be valuable.

I encourage you to allow the recreation district to be put on the ballot so the community can prove how valuable it is to us even though you might personally be against raising taxes.

Thank you for authorizing the creation of the Teton County Recreation & Public Access Master Plan (“Rec Plan”). Recreation has been consistently identified as one of the primary reasons why residents from all walks of life choose to live here, and what attracts new businesses to relocate here.¹ We commend the work of the 24-person advisory committee that you appointed to craft this thoughtful plan over the past year. This easy-to-follow document lists our community’s existing assets, proposes how they can be better managed, and outlines plans for future expansion.

This Rec Plan will benefit the entire Teton Valley community in many ways. It will:

- **Provide a clear road map for recreation industries and related businesses.** This Rec Plan enables existing employers to see exactly where the community is headed with management and expansion of our recreation infrastructure.
- **Promote business investment.** Having a clear vision for the future enables recreation industries and related businesses to feel confident in making long-term capital investments here in Teton Valley.
- **Create jobs.** These employers will likewise be able to plan for workforce expansion.
- **Help secure grants and philanthropic support.** A unified plan enables local governments and nonprofits to submit more compelling and competitive grant applications for recreation infrastructure – such as pathways funding.

- **Support coordination of funding and management.** This Rec Plan provides very specific mechanisms for how our currently-underfunded recreation assets can be better managed and steadily funded as a group.
- **Increase tourism.** Better management and funding will improve the recreation experience, which will thus attract a broader pool of year-round visitors to experience all that Teton Valley has to offer.
- **Attract new residents.** Some of these visitors may likely become new residents because they desire our community's high quality-of-life.
- **Strengthen community "ties".** As recreation becomes more accessible to all, residents will have more opportunity to interact and build relationships.
- **Improve self-esteem, physical and mental health of our children.** Most importantly, better-coordinated management of our recreation assets will provide increased options for our children to develop their physical and mental wellbeing as well as obtain sports scholarships to further their education.

On behalf of my Board and membership, I urge you to please adopt this Rec Plan as the critical first step to a community-wide, unified plan that capitalizes on our tremendous natural assets as well as provides growth opportunities for our children.

Please accept the following comments in support of the Teton County Recreation and Public Access Master Plan, on the behalf of Friends of the Teton River (FTR). FTR is a nonprofit organization dedicated to understanding and improving ground and surface water and fisheries resources in the Teton Basin. FTR furthers this mission by conducting scientific research about the Teton Watershed, using this research to enhance and protect local water resources, and communicating this information to the public.

As an individual, I am excited that the rec plan lays out realistic options for improving sports and recreation facilities my family and I can use for years to come. As the Executive Director of Friends of the Teton River, I would like to specifically comment on the following community benefits:

1) Protection and improvement of fishing and hunting access

Fishing and hunting have always been vital to the way of life in our valley. The rec plan provides a well thought-out plan for ensuring that Teton Valley's residents and visitors will maintain their right to access the Teton River for hunting and fishing purposes.

During the summer of 2013, FTR staff and volunteers conducted surveys with a diverse range of river users (from long-time valley residents to first time visitors, using the river for guided fishing trips, camping, personal fishing trips, duck hunting, and floating with young children). The most consistent recommendation among this group was to protect and expand river access, including improving parking and camping facilities at existing access points.

2) Support for grant and private funding

As a non-profit organization, FTR works hard to find private and grant funding that will have a positive impact on our community. On the recent Teton Creek Restoration Project alone, we were able to bring more than \$3 million into Teton County, the vast majority of which supported local businesses. Many private funders and grant applications require demonstrated community support before they will give money to a cause. The rec plan provides a clear message that the people of Teton Valley support recreation and public access. This will allow non-profits and local and state government entities to successfully bring in private and grant dollars to help

support maintenance, expansion, and improvement of public access, in a manner that can help support local businesses that do the work.

3) Improved public safety


Over the past several years, Teton River access points have seen a steady increase in use by Teton Valley residents and tourists. On many summer days, parking lots are overflowing, and vehicles end up parking along narrow roadways where traffic travels at a high speed. This is particularly concerning, given that many river users are families with small children. The rec plan will help generate support for improved and expanded access, which will improve safety for all river users and hopefully help to avoid a tragic accident.

4) Protection of private property

Increased use of the river corridor has led to conflicts between river users and private landowners. The rec plan will help to generate support for improved and expanded access and better signage, which will help keep river users from inadvertently using, and potentially damaging, private property.

On behalf of the FTR membership, staff, and Board of Directors, I encourage you to adopt the Teton County Recreation and Public Access Master Plan. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions.
